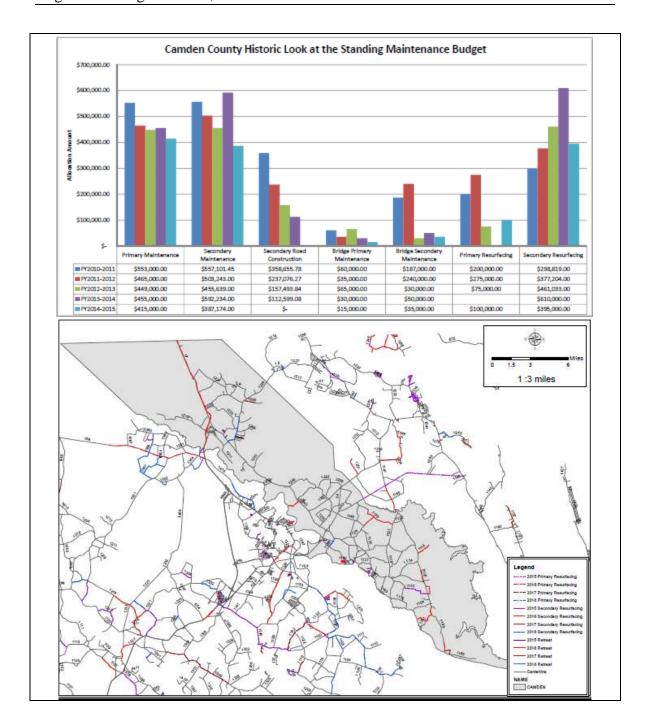
She also stated that the NCACC has recently expanded services in their research department and members have received a return of Fund Balance for the first time in her 20 years with the NCACC.

<u>Item 4.A - Ordinance 2015-04-01 - Rezoning Application - (UDO 2015-03-11) Harbinger</u> <u>Land & Timber LLC and Assorted Development Corp. Gary Dunston.</u>

Planning Director Dan Porter reminded the board that at a Public Hearing held on May 5th, 2015 staff presented the facts and findings of this Zoning issue.

Mr. Gary Dunstan owner/part owner of both properties has applied to rezone approximately 41 (farmland) of the 50 plus acres from Basic Residential (R3-2) to Basic Residential (R3-1). Property located at the intersections of Sandy Lane, Keeter Barn and Sharon Church Roads in South Mills Township. Staff presented the rezoning to the Planning Board on April 15, 2015 with the applicant present and after discussion Planning Board made the following motions:

- 1. Consistency Statement: Approved a motion that the application for rezoning was consistent with both the CAMA Land Use Plan and Comprehensive Plan as both allowed densities of 1 acre lots.
- 2. Motion was made and approved to rezone the 41 acres (farmland) from Basic Residential (R3-2) to Basic Residential (R3-1).

Mr. Porter then answered a few questions from the board.

Commissioner Garry Meiggs made a motion to approve the rezoning as it is consistent with both the CAMA Land Use Plan and the Comprehensive Plan fin that they both allow densities of one acre or more for that area and are a minimal impact on traffic and surrounding areas. The motion passed 5-0 with Chairman McLain, Vice Chair Sandra Duckwall, Commissioners Garry Meiggs, Clayton Riggs and Tom White voting aye; no Commissioner voting no; no Commissioner absent; and no Commissioner not voting.

Commissioner Tom White made a motion to rezone the 41 acres (farmland) from Basic Residential (R3-2) to Basic Residential (R3-1). Ordinance No. 2015-04-01 as presented. The motion passed 5-0 with Chairman McLain, Vice Chair Sandra Duckwall, Commissioners Garry Meiggs, Clayton Riggs and Tom White voting aye; no Commissioner voting no; no Commissioner absent; and no Commissioner not voting.

Item 5.A - New Library Hours of Operation

The County Librarian Krystal Lancaster presented a revised holiday schedule and daily operating hours as requested by the Camden Library Board of Trustees. The increase in hours should not cause any increases in salary; however, the Finance Officer has estimated that utility costs may increase by \$1,600 based on previous usage.

<u>Item 5.B - Resolution Supporting Alternative Governance Structure for the Area</u> <u>Authority (Area Board of ECBH and Coastal Care) Serving Camden County</u>

The County Manager reminds the board of Liza Wainwrights April 20th presentation requesting the board's approval of ECBH and Coastal Care merger.

The County Manager's Office has been advised that eighteen of the nineteen counties previously served by ECBH have approved the attached Alternative Governance structure. The Camden County Board of Commissioners is now being asked to formally adopt the attached resolution in support of this Alternative Governance Structure. By approving the attached resolution, the Camden County Board of Commissioners will have the ability to appoint one elected official and one non-elected representative to serve on the Area Authority Regional Board.

The County Manager has been advised that this decision is needed in order for the Regional Board to schedule and hold its first meeting prior to July 1, 2015. Should the Board of Commissioners opt not to approve and adopt the attached resolution Camden County may not have an opportunity to have representatives on the Area Authority Regional Board.

Resolution No. 2015-06-01

Resolution of Support for an Alternative Governance Structure for the Area Authority serving Camden County

WHEREAS, in accordance with N. C. General Statute § 122C – 115 (c1), the Area Board of GoastalCare, an Area Authority serving Brunswick, Carteret, New Hanover, Onslow and Pender Counties and the Area Board of East Carolina Behavioral Health, an Area Authority serving Beaufort, Bertie, Camden, Chowan, Craven, Currituck, Dare, Gates, Hertford, Hyde, Jones, Martin, Northumpton, Pamlico, Pasquotank, Perquimans, Pitt, Tyrrell, and Washington Counties, have entered into an agreement to consolidate their agencies into a twenty-four county Area Authority serving all previously names counties; and

WHEREAS, the Secretary of the N. C. Department of Health and Human Services has approved this consolidation, as required by law; and

WHEREAS, N. C. General Statute § 122C - 118.1, which specifies the composition of an Area Authority Board, permits an alternative Area Board structure to be implemented 1) if the total population of the Area Authority catchment area exceeds 1,250,000 and 2) if the counties which comprise the Area Authority agree by resolution to an alternative structure; and

WHEREAS, the total population of the new Area Authority created by the consolidation of CoastalCare and East Carolina Behavioral Health is 1,260,778; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the residents of the twenty-four counties to approve an alternative governance structure for the consolidated Area Authority.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: that we, the Camden County Board of Commissioners, do hereby approve the structure of the Area Board and the Regional Advisory Boards of the consolidated Area Authority, as outlined below,

To provide a local presence in the counties served and to assure that each county has input into the services received by its residents, the twenty four county catchment area will have three regions. The regions have been designed to equalize, to the extent possible, the other of

counties, population in the region, and overall square mileage of the regions. The three regions and the counties served are:

Northern Region: Bertie, Camden, Chowan, Currituck, Gates, Hertford, Martin, Northampton, Pasquotank and Perquimans Counties

Central Region: Beaufort, Craven, Dare, Hyde, Pamlico, Pitt, Tyrell and Washington Counties.

Southern Region: Brunswick, Carteret, Jones, New Hanover, Onslow and Pender Counties.

The counties in each region will appoint two members to the Regional Advisory Board: one county commissioner or designee and another individual who meets the requirements outlined in N. C. G. S. § 122C - 118.1 (b). In addition, the Regional Advisory Board will include the Chair or designee of the regional Consumer and Family Advisory Committee. County Commissioner members of the Regional Advisory Boards may serve for as long as they are a commissioner. Other members of the Regional Advisory Board may serve for up to three, three year consecutive terms.

The primary functions of the Regional Advisory Board will be to advise the Area Authority Chief Executive Officer on the evaluation and hiring of a Regional Director; recommending priorities for expenditure of state and county funds for development of the annual budget; determining local priorities for inclusion in the overall strategic plan; identifying community needs and concerns; monitoring resolution of issues; and monitoring performance at the local level, including access to care, expenditure of service funds, number of consumers served, services delivered, provider network size and composition, outcomes, and consumer satisfaction.

Each Regional Advisory Board will establish its own bylaws based on local needs, but in compliance with standardized requirements established by the Governing Board for quorums, frequency of meetings, elections of officers, duties of members, committees and committee appointments, and attendance standards. Such bylaws are subject to the approval of the Governing Board.

Each Regional Advisory Board will select four (4) members to serve as the Area Authority Governing Board: one county commissioner, the Consumer and Family Advisory Committee chair or designee, and two other members. In addition, the chair or designee of the Area Authority Network Council shall serve on the Governing Board as a non-voting member. The county commissioner members of the Governing Board shall serve one three year term without consecutive reappointment, so that commissioner representation on the Governing Board will rotate among the counties in each region. The other members of the Governing Board may serve three, three year terms.

The Governing Board's primary responsibilities will include determining policy; strategy planning, including consideration of local priorities as determined by the Regional Boards; budgets; hiring and evaluations of the Chief Executive Officer; monitoring deliverables, including overall performance and financial management; government affairs and

advocacy; reporting to constituent counties; responding to concerns and feedback from the Regional Advisory Boards; reviewing, revising and approving the Regional Advisory Board bylaws; and all other responsibilities outlined in N. C. law for Area Authority Boards. The Governing Board will develop and adopt bylaws to address its activities in accordance with law.

Item 5.C - Student Generation Rates

Planning Director Dan Porter advised the board that on April 16 the APFO Coordinating Committee recommended changing the Student Generation Rate for tracking impacts of housing development. If approved the new rates will be applied retroactively to the beginning of the current school year and carried forward into future years. The table below shows the exiting rates versus the rates as calculated from actual development over the last 10 years.

Commissioner Clayton Riggs made a motion to approve the new Student Generation Rates as elementary .24, middle .23, and high school .18 for a total of .65 students per school.

Commissioner Garry Meiggs wants to know what history is involved in the elementary school numbers because the enrollment numbers have dropped. Dan Porter advised these numbers are based on a 10 year calculation.

After some discussion Commissioner Riggs withdrawals his motion and requests information based on 3 year, 5 year, and 10 year development numbers.

Item 5.D - Resolution Supporting EDA Public Works Grant Application

The County Manager Mike Renshaw states that Camden County staff has prepared an application to the Economic Development Administration to assist in constructing an 80,000 GPD sewer treatment plant in the Courthouse Township at a projected cost of approximately \$1.8 million. The maximum EDA grant available is \$500,000 and requires a \$500,000 local matching contribution.

WHEREAS, Camden County is need of additional sewer capacity to serve increasing business activity along US Hwy 158 in the Courthouse Township area; AND

WHEREAS, the Economic Development Administration (EDA) has a competitive public works infrastructure grant program to construct infrastructure facilities which promote economic development of distressed regions; AND

WHEREAS, Camden County Census Tract 37029950102 meets the EDA unemployment distress criteria for program eligibility; AND

WHEREAS, the location primary beneficiaries is the above referenced census tract, AND

WHEREAS. The County has owns a 60 acre tract of land adjacent to the census tract to site a sewer treatment plant and high rate infiltration ponds; AND

WHEREAS, the county has prepared a Preliminary Engineering Report and conducted soil suitability tests, AND

WHEREAS, the projected cost of the proposed 80,000 gallon per day Amphidrome treatment plant and related high rate infiltration ponds is approximately \$ 1.8 million

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED. That Camden County Board of County Stoners approves submittal of an application for Public Works assistance from the Economic Development Administration for \$500,000 to assist construction of an Amphidome Wastevater Treatment of an it county of provide the required \$500,000 matching cash contribution.

Item 5.E - FY 2015-2016 Annual Budget Message Presentation

The County Manager Mike Renshaw presents an overview of the proposed FY 2015-2016 Annual Budget. He advises the public that two budget work sessions were held with the Board of Commissioners on May 19th and 21st, and there will be a Public Hearing on the Proposed Budget on June 8th at 7:00 P.M. in the Historic Courthouse. A detailed budget document is available at the Camden County Administrative Office (330 US HWY 158 East) for public review.

Budget Priorities

- Implement an Ad Valorem tax at .68/\$100 based upon recent revaluation (calculated revenue-neutral rate is .69/\$100 valuation)
- Provide a 2% Cost of Living Allowance to county staff
- · Invest wisely in critical water and wastewater treatment infrastructure
- Fund expanded EMS in the county through addition of a second ambulance crew in South Mills Station 14
- Reduce departmental operating expenses wherever possible
- Maintain a healthy reserve fund balance in accordance with financial policies outlined in Resolution 2007-05-04
- Continue to provide outstanding government services at adequate levels

Economic Forecast

- NC economy still slow to recover, expanding at only 1.7% in 2014
- NCACC projects continued slow growth statewide of 3-4% in FY 15-16
- Growth rate highly dependent upon local economic climate, housing starts, and state tax reform efforts
- · Aging population foretells lower consumer spending and smaller labor force
- Fourteen of the 15 state economic sectors are expected to grow modestly, led by construction at 5.5%
- · Uptick in Camden retail/commercial economic activity
