- Phase 2 Extension and Mandatory Face Coverings: Gov. Cooper issued Executive Order 147, which extends the Safer at Home Phase 2 Order until 5p.m. on July 17, and requires the wearing of face coverings in public settings. These actions are needed to slow the spread, which has been on the rise. Additional information regarding Frequently Asked Questions for EO 147 and Requirement for the Use of Face Coverings and Masks is also available.
- North Carolina continues to receive resources of critical supplies from FEMA. As of June 19, FEMA has obligated \$173.2 million in federal support to North Carolina.
- ➤ COVID-19 testing is available for those meeting criteria by appointment only at local health departments. Residents are encouraged to call their primary care provider for an assessment or information on testing availability before calling the local health department. If someone does not have a primary care provider, ARHS does offer primary care services. All tests will be completed through a curbside screening clinic at the local health department. Testing is available at Pasquotank (252-338-4400) and Camden (252-338-4460) Health Departments on Thursday 1-3 pm. For more information on criteria for COVID-19 testing or appointments, call 252-338-WELL/9355 or your local health department directly at the above phone number.
- Nursing Home Testing for COVID-19: The NC Department of Health and Human Services is collaborating with CVS/Omnicare for a one-time COVID-19 testing initiative of all residents and staff in nursing homes. An estimated 36,000 residents and 25,000 staff in over 400 nursing homes in the state will be tested between now and the middle of August.
- Infectious disease specialists believe the coronavirus has mutated since it started spreading in late 2019, and a variant known as "G" is now dominant across the United States and the world. While the mutation doesn't appear to make people sicker there is a concern that it has made the virus more contagious. In contrast to the first round of U.S. infections, which hit the elderly hardest, now younger adults are finding they are not invulnerable to the disease. More than a third of hospitalized COVID-19 patients nationwide are now aged 18-49. Albemarle Regional Health Services eight county region provided the following Surveillance Report for positive cases during the week of June 22-26.

➤ Migrant farmworkers are a high risk group; especially as COVID-19 can spread easily in setting where many people live in close proximity — <u>Updated guidance</u> is available for Migrant Farmworkers, their employers, and housing providers to help prevent the spread of disease among workers.

Following a recent review of the City of Elizabeth City's Electrical billing records they identified 133 delinquent commercial accounts, all which are at least 30 days past due and total \$205,059.71 in uncollected revenue. Many of these businesses are still active. Electric personnel delivered notices on June 25th to commercial customers giving until July 6th to make arrangements for payments on past due balances.

The City requested a waiver to the Governor's Executive order halting disconnection of residential utility services to all delinquent utility accounts as the city currently has more than 2,200 and is set to run out of money in its electric fund by August. The waiver was granted on Tuesday, June 30th. This waiver requires delinquent city residential utility customer to pay their July bill by the end of July or be disconnected. The city will work with delinquent customers to establish ECOVID-19 Hardship Agreements based on certain criteria. The Griffin Street Satellite location will reopen to assist customers in setting up hardship agreements on an appointment only basis.

- Wednesday, June 24th New York, New Jersey and Connecticut Governors imposed a 14-day quarantine on travelers from nine states with spiking COVID-19 infection rates and steep fines for noncompliance. North Carolina is one of the nine states. The infection rate is based on the number of infections per 100,000 residents on a 7-day rolling average. People who don't voluntarily quarantine for 14 days will be subject to fines and a mandatory quarantine. Fines will be \$2,000 for the first violation, \$5,000 for the second and up to \$10,000 if they cause harm.
- COVID-19 Patients Presumed to be Recovered is updated every Monday by 4 p.m. The estimated number of patients presumed to be recovered from symptoms from COVID-19 is used in combination with other measures to provide a general sense of how many people with COVID-19 have likely recovered from symptoms. <u>June 29</u>, 2020 Patients Presumed to be Recovered = 45,538

- New Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) Guidance during the C19 Pandemic: The U.S. Small Business Administration and the U.S. Department of the Treasury released new guidance regarding the Paycheck Protection Program:
 - Frequently Asked Questions Updated 6/25
 - Interim Final Rule on Certain Eligible Payroll Costs Updated 6/25
- The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has updated its list of COVID-19 symptoms to include stuff or runny nose, nausea or vomiting and diarrhea. The full list includes:
 - Fever or chills
 - Cough
 - Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
 - Fatigue
 - Muscle or body aches
 - Headache

- New loss of taste or smell
- Sore throat
- Congestion or runny nose
- Nausea or vomiting
- Diarrhea

Symptoms appear 2 to 14 days after someone is exposed to the virus and can range from mild to severe. People will experience different symptoms, including those not on the list. In many cases, coronavirus symptoms can be managed at home. People should seek emergency care if they experience the following:

- Trouble breathing
- Persistent pain or pressure in the chest
- New confusion
- Inability to wake or stay awake
- Bluish lips or face

Anyone with symptoms is asked self-isolate at home to avoid spreading the virus to vulnerable populations.

Pasquotank County Small Business Grant Program is open for applications.

Pasquotank County officials announce the COVID-19 Small Business Grant Program. The program provides *\$250,000 in grant funds for qualifying small businesses that have been adversely impacted by COVID-19.*Small businesses within the County can apply for grants of up to \$2,500. The County has designated the Elizabeth City/Pasquotank County Economic Development Commission (EC/PCEDC) as the agency to administer the program, and is partnering with Elizabeth City Downtown, Inc. - The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has issued a warning to the public to avoid using nine different hand sanitizer products that have been found to contain a substance that can be potentially fatal when absorbed through the skin, or ingested. In a <u>statement</u>, the FDA said the following nine hand sanitizer manufactured by <u>EskBiochem SA de CV</u> in Mexico should not be used:
 - All-Clean Hand Sanitizer (NDC: 74589-002-01)
 - Esk Biochem Hand Sanitizer (NDC: 74589-007-01)
 - CleanCare NoGerm Advanced Hand Sanitizer 75% Alcohol (NDC: 74589-008-04)
 - Lavar 70 Gel Hand Sanitizer (NDC: 74589-006-01)
 - The Good Gel Antibacterial Gel Hand Sanitizer (NDC: 74589-010-10)
 - CleanCare NoGerm Advanced Hand Sanitizer 80% Alcohol (NDC: 74589-005-03)
 - CleanCare NoGerm Advanced Hand Sanitizer 75% Alcohol (NDC: 74589-009-01)
 - CleanCare NoGerm Advanced Hand Sanitizer 80% Alcohol (NDC: 74589-003-01)
 - Saniderm Advanced Hand Sanitizer (NDC: 74589-001-01)

The FDA says it tested samples of Lavar Gel and CleanCare No Germ. Lavar Gel was found to contain 81% (v/v) methanol and no ethyl alcohol, and CleanCare No Germ contains 28% (v/v) methanol. According to the FDA, "Methanol is not an acceptable ingredient for hand sanitizers and should not be used due to its toxic effects."

Beginning Monday, June 22nd, the American Red Cross will be testing all blood, platelet, and plasma donations for COVID-19 antibodies in North Carolina. There continues to be an urgent need for blood as hospitals commence surgeries and other procedures. Donors will know within seven to 10 days if their immune system has produced antibodies in response to the virus.

- Through a public-private partnership, North Carolina has created the nation's first statewide technology platform, NCCARE360, to coordinate whole-person care uniting traditional healthcare settings and organizations that address non-medical drivers of health, such as food, housing, transportation, employment and interpersonal safety. NCCARE360 is now available in all 100 counties. Read more about it here.
- Senior Planet is a website that uses technology to enable older adults and people of all ages to come together and find ways to learn, work, create, and thrive in today's digital age. They offer courses, programs, and activities to help seniors learn new skills, save money, get in shape, while making new friends.
- ➤ North Carolina state parks and recreation areas, as well as trails, are all open, but visitor centers, picnic shelters and swim areas remain closed. Visit the N.C. State Parks website for the open/closed status of individual parks and recreation areas.

The North Carolina Zoo reopened Monday, June 15th. One-way pathways and ground decals will encourage social distancing. Frequently touched areas and bathrooms are being cleaned throughout the day. There are hand sanitizer stations throughout the zoo. The gift shop is also open with limited capacity.

- ➤ **Albemarle District Jail** Effective June 22nd all activities involving on site visitors and bondsman are remained as is due to COVID-19.
 - Attorney may have legal visits with the clients after passing the COVID-19 screening. Attorneys will be denied entry if they are unable to pass this screening and will be advised to use Juris Link for legal visits.
 - All Bondsman will be denied entry. Bondsman's paperwork will need to be completed and completed paperwork will be given to a staff member at the door for processing.
 - All deliveries (UPS, FEDEX, and USPS) will not be allowed in the building, a staff member will meet at the door to pick up deliveries.
 - All weekenders coming to report to serve time will be scheduled by their Probation/Parole Officer. They will need to contact their Probation/Patrol Office regarding any issues. All weekenders will be screened prior to entering Albemarle District Jail. If they do not pass screening they will be denied. If they are not on time they will be denied. All weekenders that are denied will be reported to their Probation/Parole Officer and will be rescheduled at a later date. No exceptions.
- In response to questions from youth, amateur and collegiate teams and sports program administrators who are seeking guidance as to how to hold outdoor sports practice and outdoor sports competition with their full roster of athletes, coaches and other athletic support staff, while remaining in compliance with Executive Order No. 141 NCDHHS has issued a Supplementary Guidance for Sporting Events Held in Outdoor Facilities.
- North Carolina continues to increase testing capabilities and has more than tripled the amount of testing completed just a month ago. New online tools are available to help people know if they may need a test, how to get a test, and monitor their own symptoms if advised to do so by a contact tracer. These tools include:
 - Check My Symptoms (<u>www.ncdhhs.gov/symptoms</u>), a public website that allows people to enter their symptoms to determine if they should consider getting tested for COVID-19. If a test is recommended, they will receive a link to a list of nearby testing sites via email or text.
 - Find my Testing Place (<u>www.ncdhhs.gov/TestingPlace</u>) a public website that allows people to enter their county or ZIP code and access a list of nearby testing site locations online.
- > Tuesday, June 9th NCDHHS released <u>updated guidance</u> for doctors and clinicians on who should be tested for COVID-10.
- COVID-19 Contact Tracing One way to know you may have been exposed to another person who has COVID-19 is if you receive a call from a contact tracer. Contact tracers, including local health department staff, reach out to people who may have recently come into close contact with someone who tests positive for COVID-19.

It is important to answer the call when a contact tracer reaches out. He or she will connect you with the information and support you need to protect yourself and your loved ones. Here's what will happen if you are contacted:

- You will get an initial text from the number 45394 or email from MC-ARIAS-NoReply@dhhs.nc.gov.
- Someone from your **local health department** or **NC OUTREACH (844-628-7223)** will follow up with phone calls.
- You may be advised by your contact tracer to use the COVID-19 Community Team Outreach (CCTO) Tool, a
 password-protected online resource to track your symptoms.

A contact tracer will never ask for your Social Security Number, bank or credit card numbers, or any other financial information at any time. Any information shared during your call with a contact tracer is a private health record and is strictly confidential.

Testing and tracing are core public health measures and key components of North Carolina's strategy to responsibly ease restrictions, while continuing to slow the spread of the virus. If you believe you or a loved one may need a COVID-19 test, <u>check your symptoms</u> and <u>find a testing place</u>.

DHHS has a new infographic that explains the testing and contact tracing process. This sample scenario, available in English and Spanish, takes you through the steps of contract tracing when someone has a positive test for COVID-19.

The N.C. Inclusive Disaster Recovery (NCIDR) network has developed a <u>living document</u> listing Resources and Engagement Opportunities for organizations serving historically under-resourced and marginalized communities during the COVID-19 Pandemic.



- Below is information regarding the reopening of Elizabeth City Facilities in Phase 2
 - All tennis courts, city docks, basketball courts and skate park will be open. (City Staff is working to have the Splash Pad open by June 1st). The 25-person restriction will apply in all these areas.
 - All City playground equipment and tot-lots will remain closed.
 - The lobby to the Public Safety Building will be opened limited to three people at a time. Masks must be worn by all visitors.
 - City Hall and the customer service area will remain closed to utility customers. Customers requiring
 new service applications and wanting to see administration must continue to make an appointment. A
 mask must be worn by the public.
 - The Griffith Street satellite office will remain closed for the near future. The payment kiosk and driveup window is available and the public is encouraged to use these options.
 - The Midgett Building will be opened masks must be worn by City staff and their customers.
 - All public restrooms will remain closed but may be open (by appointment) for special events that do not exceed 25 people.

- As most organized activities such as baseball, softball, and soccer exceed the 25-person limit, staff will defer opening up the athletic fields until Phase 3.
- The Senior Center will remain closed until gyms are allowed to open.
- Camden County facilities/buildings are open in accordance with Phase 2 allowance.
- ➤ Pasquotank County Pasquotank County will no longer require public interaction by appointment only in the Courthouse and Tax/Register of Deeds/GIS office. The following are the exceptions that will require appointments:
 - Register of Deeds Office Marriage Licenses please call 252-335-4367 for appointments, and
 - Clerk of Courts Office Civil and Estate matters (which always require appointments) please call Civil 331-4642 and Estates 331-4643.
 - The Elections Office is open.

Temporary shields have been placed at the Planning and Inspections and Register of Deeds counters to help protect the public and staff. Pasquotank County encourages the public to use the following COVID-19 protective measures:

- 1. The public is still encouraged to limit non-essential in-person interaction with Pasquotank County employees and departments when at all possible to help prevent the spread of COVID-19. Citizens are encouraged to use any online services that may be available in addition to communicating with Pasquotank County employees via email or telephone.
- 2. Please explore the Pasquotank County website at <u>www.pasquotankcountync.org</u> or call the desired department to determine if alternative service delivery options are available.
- 3. All citizens who are experiencing any type of respiratory or flu-like symptoms should not visit any Pasquotank County facility. Please call the relevant department to make alternative arrangements for service provision.
 - Consistent with North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services recommendations, Pasquotank County recommends the public follow the three W's – Wear, Wait and Wash in county buildings:
 - Wear a cloth face covering if you will be with other people,
 - Wait six feet apart while avoiding close contact, and
 - Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds or use hand sanitizer.

These guidelines are recommended, not required.

- Sentara Albemarle Medical Center:
 - The following visitor policies will take effect on Thursday, May 7 at noon. This will apply to most Sentara hospitals, including all levels of care and the Emergency Department.
 - All non-COVID-19 patients and patients who are not under investigation for COVID-19 may have **one visitor**.
 - Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) and end-of-life patients may have **two visitors**.

All visitors will be screened and have their temperatures taken by a no-touch device before entering the building and will be required to wear a mask. Sentara will provide a community-made mask to visitors who do not have their own. Sentara is taking all necessary precautions to keep our hospitals safe and clean. All areas of the hospitals will be carefully cleaned and disinfected on an ongoing basis. All employees are also masked for your protection.
