What is Happening in Your County??

Camden County Management Office HAS MOVED !! If you need to contact the County Manager, Clerk to the Board of Commissioners, Human Resources, or Finance Department, the aforementioned address/phone numbers will get you there.

Departments that have NOT moved include Planning (Permits, Inspections, GIS/Mapping, & Zoning), Tax, and Water. They are still located in the beige building behind and to the left of the courthouse, and look forward to serving your needs.

Camden County Mosquito Spraying Program

If you have a mosquito problem in your area and would like to have the county spray for mosquitoes, please call 252-338-6363 ext. 111 or email dcredle@camdencountync.gov or btterrano@camdencountync.gov and leave your name, address and contact information for our records.

During the month of May, Camden County Public Works was busy setting monitor and trap sites throughout the County in order to collect required information as to the number and type of mosquitoes. Armed with this information, the County will begin spraying operations beginning in June.

Please note the following with regard to mosquito spraying:

- Camden only has 1 truck with a mounted spraying device;
- Spraying cannot be performed within 100 feet of any waterway;
- Spraying cannot be performed if the wind speed for the day is forecast to exceed 10 miles per hour;
- Spraying cannot be performed in wet or rainy conditions;
- Spraying can ONLY be performed when temperatures are between 50-95° F;
- Chemical used is Aqua-Reslin, with the active ingredient Permethrin.

Be Proactive. Mosquitoes breed in standing water. Reducing the number of mosquitoes can be as simple as emptying water from containers around your house. For example, you can eliminate mosquito breeding grounds by removing unused plastic pools, old tires, buckets, and clearing clogged gutters. By eliminating any item that can hold water, including low areas in your yard, and keeping the water changed in bird baths, you can reduce the mosquito population in your area without using insecticides.

Camden County Planning Department

Comprehensive Plan Project Update

The Camden County Comprehensive Planning Process is nearing completion. The consultants and staff developed a **“Development Capacity and Alternative Development Scenarios Report”** and presented it to the Steering Committee in February. Following a review of the report the Committee selected a Targeted Development approach to prepare a **“Planning Framework Report”** with a Vision Statement, Goals, Objectives, Action Strategies and a Draft Future Land Use Map. The committee reviewed the report and provided feedback regarding which goals and objectives were most important. Two public workshops were advertised through in a mailer to every address in the county, and were held on May 8 at the high school. Approximately 65 citizens viewed displays of the key themes and the draft Future Land Use Map, and provided feedback through one on one discussions around the displays, comment cards, and a polling exercise. All of the project reports, maps, and notes can be found by visiting the Camden County website (camdencountync.gov) and clicking on the link to “Comprehensive Plan”.

A complete draft of the Comprehensive Plan should be available in mid June for review by the Steering Committee, other county committees, and all interested citizens of the county. This schedule will allow for ample opportunity for community comments prior to presentation to the Board of Commissioners in August 2012. Comments and questions about the Comprehensive Plan are welcome and can be sent to dporter@camdencountync.gov.

The Comprehensive Transportation Plan (CTP) is also on track. Information has been gathered about existing traffic counts, deficient roads, crashes, and community goals and objectives. Traffic counts have been projected through 2040 based on estimated population growth of the county and surrounding areas. This and other information was presented at the May 8 public meetings and can be found at <http://www.ncdot.gov/doh/preconstruct/tpb/planning/CamdenCo.html>. The resulting recommendations will address all modes of transportation in the county.

The CTP will provide a broad long range overview or transportation needs, with little to no funding constraints. It serves as the foundation from which transportation officials develop a 10 year plan with general priorities, and then more detailed 5 year work program with specific projects and funding recommendations.

Stormwater

The Planning Department and the Camden Soil & Water Conservationist are making progress toward identifying key stormwater issues and preparing a work plan to improve drainage in the county through an ongoing maintenance program. The four (4) stormwater advisory committees in South Mills, Sawyers Creek, North River, and Shiloh have met as a group and individually to share their knowledge of critical problems and locations, and the variety of efforts to solve them. The result is a GIS map of all the streams, creeks, ditches, and major problem areas, showing which conveyances are maintained privately and which ones are being proposed for the maintenance program. Our GIS Technician is searching our existing data base and other outside sources to map topography and drainage flows. We are currently preparing a stormwater maintenance budget and researching funding options. Our immediate goal is to report short and long term recommendations to the Board of Commissioners in July or August.

Additionally, staff has met with several subdivision Home Owners Associations to educate residents about their maintenance responsibilities related to compliance with the subdivision’s state issued stormwater permit. Also we described efforts that individual homeowners can take that will help the overall stormwater system. A few of the key actions that homeowners can take include: 1) keep your ditches mowed and free of shrubs, debris, and grass clippings; 2) but do not kill all the vegetation that reduces erosion; 3) make a rain barrel connected to downspouts and reuse water running off roofs;


4) build a depressed rain garden to catch and absorb runoff before it enters your ditch; and 5) do not replace your ditch with a drain pipe (it simply pushes the problem to your neighbors).

Public Works

The South Camden Water & Sewer District implemented an ACH program in October 2011, as a more convenient way for customers to pay their bills. The ACH program is an Automatic Withdrawal service, provided at no cost to our customers. This program has been a great success thus far and we would like to encourage our customers to sign up for this FREE service. Authorization forms are available at the Customer Service window of the Camden County Water Department located at 117 NC Hwy 343 North.

Authorization forms need to be in our office no later than the 20th of the month, with a voided check attached, to begin on the following billing cycle. Finance

The Finance Department is working with the County Manager on the FY12-13 Budget for the county. The Public Hearing on the budget was held on June 11. Approval of the Budget is scheduled for the June 18 Commissioner meeting.

With June 30 the close of the Fiscal Year 2011-2012, we are gathering information which the auditor has requested. October 30 is the date that our audit is due to the Local Government Commission.

Tax Department

Real and personal property bills will be sent out in August 2012. They are due September 1, 2012. You have until January 6, 2013 to pay before they become delinquent. You can also make prepayments and once the real estate bills are mailed you can also pay on your bill until the interest begins.

Vehicle bills are sent out each month according to when you renew your tags. You have 30 days to pay before interest starts. After 4 months the tag will become blocked. When a tag is blocked it has to be paid by cash or money order. No Checks.

All bills can be paid by cash, check, money order, cashier's check. Again the only time you have to pay cash is when a vehicle tag is blocked. You can also pay on-line with official payments. The web site is www.officialpayments.com or by telephone. The number is 1-800-272-9829. The jurisdiction code is 4375. There is a 3% charge of the total bill or min. of a \$1.00.

Board of Elections

Second Primary Election July 17, 2012

On Tuesday, July 17 there will be a 2nd Primary Election for both Democrats and Republicans in Camden County. Democrats will vote for the NC Commissioner of Labor and Republicans will voter for NC Lieutenant Governor, NC Commissioner of Insurance, NC Secretary of State and NC Superintendent of Public Instruction.

Voters affiliated with the Democratic Party may vote in the Democratic 2nd Primary. Voters affiliated with the Republican Party may vote in the Republican 2nd Primary. Voters who are registered as Unaffiliated and participated in the Democratic Party's Primary Election on May 8, 2012 may vote in the Democratic 2nd Primary. Voters who are registered as Unaffiliated and participated in the Republican Party's May 8, 2012 Primary Election may vote in the Republican 2nd Primary. Voters who are registered as Unaffiliated and voted in the Non-partisan elections on May 8, 2012 may NOT participate in the 2nd Primary.

One-stop Absentee voting will be June 28 through July 14, 2012 with no voting on July 4, 2012.

Dismal Swamp Welcome Center

Did you know that despite its foreboding name, the Great Dismal Swamp is one of few remaining American wildernesses and is home to black bear, bobcats, river otters, reptiles and many rare plants? It is the largest intact remnant of a vast habitat that once covered more than one million acres of northeastern North Carolina. Especially attractive to birders and nature lovers, the Great Dismal Swamp boasts 200 species of birds, yellow-bellied and spotted turtles, lizards, salamanders, frogs and toads.

Despite its impressive size and age, the Great Dismal Swamp's thick forests still protect its wildlife and wards off most would be intruders. But for those who boldly venture in, the Dismal Swamp shelters a wealth of history and lore, flora and fauna. Visitors to the Welcome Center may participate in hiking, biking, nature photography, wildlife observation, on the Dismal Swamp Canal Trail. The 22-mile historic canal offers hours of fishing, boating, kayaking and canoeing fun.



While your kids are out of school, consider visiting the Dismal Swamp State Parks visitor's center. Learn why George Washington called the Dismal Swamp "a glorious paradise", or how the swamp was important in the Underground Railroad. Observe the ecological importance of Camden County wetlands in the state parks visitor center and exhibit hall. All of this and more can be found just 3 miles south of the NC border on US Hwy 17.

The Dismal Swamp Welcome Center can assist you with any plans to visit areas in our state. With over 500 brochures, maps and travel guides, you can find a great destination to enjoy history, recreation or just relax. Great People in Camden

One evening my son moved my wallet from my usual location to another that he thought it was better; he then forgot where it was. Now I went on my usual way, worked all day, and closed up the shop. Upon leaving to go home I realized that my wallet had fallen out of the window earlier that morning, and haven been at work all day hadn't noticed its absence.

The next morning around 6:30AM, a man calls to say that he had my wallet, and had found it in the road, and by the way, it still has your money in it. Amazed, I set up a location to meet and retrieve my wallet.
