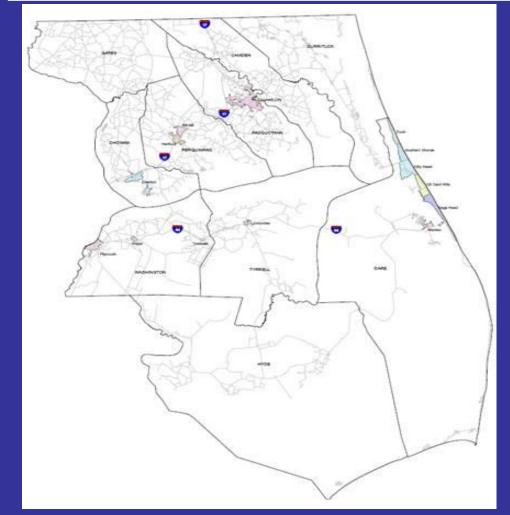

SUMMARY:

On February 20 the One Mill Park Project Engineer advised the County Manager of the need for the attached Change Order to the original contract amount. During excavation/removal of the current bulkhead the contractor discovered a large amount (approximately 342 cubic yards) of unsuitable construction debris which had been placed over the years to support the old existing bulkhead.

As the presence and composition of this construction debris was unknown at the time of project bid, the attached Change Order #1 to Contract 1 Waterfront Improvements is needed. Included within the Change Order amount of \$10,322.64 is \$4,618.25 for undercut and hauling charges and \$5,704.39 in required backfill charges.

RECOMMENDATION:

<u>2015 Goal:</u> Seek legislation to repeal the statutory authority under NC G.S. 115C-431(c) that allows local school boards to file suit against a county board of commissioners over county appropriations for education.

Talking Points:

- N.C. Gen. Stat. 115C-431(c) expressly authorizes school boards to sue counties over "sufficiency" of current expense or capital funding levels, leaving courts and juries to determine sufficiency.
- School boards are not expressly permitted to sue the state or federal governments for lack of sufficient funding, and no other entity is specifically granted this power to sue a taxing authority over funding sufficiency.
- This statutory authorization inherently creates an adversarial relationship between the school boards and the boards of county commissioners and has cost taxpayers millions of dollars in legal fees and litigation expenses.

<u>Requested Action:</u> Repeal the statutory provision that expressly authorizes school boards to sue county commissioners over local education appropriations.

Background: A local school board is required to submit its budget request for the upcoming fiscal year to the board of county commissioners no later than May 15 of each year. The county commissioners must adopt a budget ordinance, which sets the tax rate for the county and includes an appropriation for the local school board, on or before July 1 of each year. If a dispute arises over the amount appropriated, N.C.G.S. 115C-431 governs the process for resolving that dispute. The parties would first participate in a joint board meeting, and if no agreement is reached, they would proceed with mediation. If mediation is unsuccessful, the school board may file an action in superior court challenging the sufficiency of the appropriation.

In 2013, the Union County Board of Education filed a lawsuit against the Union County Board of Commissioners challenging the sufficiency of the education funding appropriated for operating expenses and capital outlay. The amount in dispute was \$8M. Following a trial lasting more than eight weeks, a jury awarded the school board \$91M in additional funds. The Union County Board appealed, and the matter is currently pending before the North Carolina Court of Appeals. The bill for legal fees and related expenses has reached nearly \$2M, and that financial responsibility will be borne by Union County taxpayers.

<u>2015 Goal:</u> Seek legislation to restore the statutory requirement that 40% of the net lottery proceeds be allocated to counties for school capital needs and increase the annual appropriation of lottery funds until the 40% allocation is restored.

Talking Points:

- Counties on average spend 41% of their total budgets on public education, or \$4 billion each year, with 2/3 of these monies directed at public school operating expense.
- Counties have assumed some state-shared school funding responsibilities in recent years, such as the entirety of school utility costs.
- 70 counties dedicate all or part of their lottery proceeds to repay school debt service; smaller counties have banked their lottery proceeds to amass sufficient funding for major school construction or renovation projects.

Requested Action:

- Restore the statutory guarantee that 40% of net lottery proceeds are to be allocated to counties for school capital needs.
- Increase the annual appropriation of lottery proceeds for school construction each year as the state's economic conditions improve, until the 40% allocation is fully restored.

Background: When the N.C. Education Lottery was enacted, counties were promised that 40% of net proceeds would go to the Public School Building Capital Fund for county school construction needs. Counties were encouraged to rely on these funds and incur debt service for public school construction and renovation.

Since 2010, the General Assembly has set the county lottery appropriation below the statutory 40% of the net proceeds and has appropriated a flat \$100 million, which represents approximately 17% of the expected net proceeds. Consequently, counties have lost more than half a billion dollars in school construction funds since the recession, and counties have been forced to delay construction projects, to use their emergency fund balances to make up the debt service losses, or to reduce funding for other essential services.

In 2014, the General Assembly rewrote the lottery statutes to eliminate the 40% statutory guarantee of lottery proceeds for school construction needs. Removing the 40% guarantee discourages new county investments in school capital projects and may result in future legislatures using those dollars to fund something other than school construction.

<u>2015 Goal:</u> Support the current model of public mental health administration, ensure adequate state funding for services and facilities at the local level, and structure appropriate county participation in governance.

Talking Points:

- Publicly led and held mental health agencies promote access to community services and encourage effective service partnerships with other public entities.
- County jails and sheriff departments are diverted from their core responsibilities when behavioral crisis services are not readily available within the community.
- County residents engage county commissioners to help access human services, including mental health crisis response.

Requested Action:

- Maintain public behavioral services administration within the current organizational structure.
- Consider restoration of past budget cuts in state mental health dollars, with a focus on targeting resources to community mental health services.
- Explore constructive county participation in local mental health governance.

Background: While North Carolina counties largely fund social services administration and health services, the state has been responsible for mental health expenses. Public behavioral health services have traditionally been administered through local public agencies to ensure access, respond to unique community needs, and build on local partnerships and resources with other human services agencies.

North Carolina is examining what Medicaid organizational structures will provide appropriate and quality health care while controlling state Medicaid costs. Competing models include outsourced managed care services versus provider-led voluntary networks of care. In addition, to minimize financial and risk exposure, the state is completing a massive restructuring of community mental health services, converting and merging existing local management entities into managed care organizations charged with overseeing a capitated model of funding. It is expected that the current number of LMEs/MCOs will be consolidated into as few as four within the next biennium. This consolidation has necessitated LME board consolidation as well, leaving fewer opportunities for direct county representation. A new structure for county participation will ensure that county officials can continue to serve as community representatives of mental health clients and their families.

State budget cuts and federal policy changes have reduced support to crisis services, chronic mental health management, and state psychiatric hospital capacity. Public guardianship responsibilities have shifted from LMEs to county social services staff. Federal requirements and state policies have attempted to shift in-patient mental health care from state psychiatric hospitals to community settings.

<u>2015 Goal:</u> Support continued state funding of Medicaid and support efforts by the state to provide healthcare access for all citizens.

Talking Points:

- If North Carolina were to push part of the cost of Medicaid services onto counties, it would be the only state to do so.
- Counties' budgets simply are unable to absorb this unpredictable, growing cost.
- Counties continue to fund the full non-federal share (25 percent) of Medicaid administrative costs mainly eligibility determination and staff training.

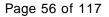
Requested Action:

• Maintain state responsibility for medical costs covered by Medicaid.

Background: North Carolina was the last state requiring counties to participate in funding Medicaid services (medical bills for Medicaid patients), drawing 15 percent of the non-federal share for services from counties. Though they were required to share the costs, counties could not influence Medicaid cost increases, policy, eligibility criteria, service options or provider rates. From 2000 to 2006, county Medicaid costs increased 78 percent, in some counties costing more than their education budgets.

A provision in the 2007 budget act implemented a three-year transfer of Medicaid services costs from counties to the state. In exchange, the provision transferred ½ cent sales tax from counties to the state general fund, equivalent to about \$491 million in fiscal year 2014. While the exchange was about an equal amount statewide, some counties lost money in the transfer. A hold harmless was put in place to ensure all counties benefit at least \$500 million. The 2014 budget act rolled back that additional benefit (phased in over three years), simply ensuring that no counties lose money in the exchange.

<u>2015 Goal:</u> Support legislation, regulations and funding that would preserve local option authority where needed to deploy community broadband systems to ensure community access to critical broadband services.

Talking Points:

- High speed Internet access is essential to economic development, and allowing counties to deploy broadband infrastructure and services will help attract, retain and grow commerce.
- As technology plays a larger role in the classroom, county-supported broadband services can help connect students both in the classroom and at home. This ensures critical learning opportunities are not missed when students lose access to research capabilities, homework support, and lessons in homes without affordable broadband Internet.

<u>Requested Action:</u> Grant local authority to support broadband connectivity for residents, students and businesses through policies and funding that allow counties to invest in community broadband infrastructure and Internet services.

Background: Session Law 2012-86 allowed counties to provide grants to Internet service providers to expand broadband access; however, local governments are constrained by Session Law 2011-84 from establishing or supporting telecommunication services, particularly broadband Internet service. The law specifically prohibits local governments from establishing broadband service and setting prices below the cost to provide service, and requires any municipal broadband to make payments equivalent to taxes and fees paid by for-profit providers.

Counties in North Carolina have expressed interest in establishing broadband infrastructure and supporting connectivity to existing broadband services, but are constrained under current law. Two municipalities in North Carolina, Wilson and Salisbury, provide broadband Internet service. Salisbury's fiber optic service serves around 3,000 customers. Wilson's service reaches around 7,000 customers. These are some of the only areas in the state offering a 1 gigabyte connection speed. Wilson's provider has plans to expand services; however, it is prohibited by S.L. 2011-84 from growing beyond Wilson County to neighboring counties where a demand for broadband access exists. The City of Wilson has petitioned the Federal Communications Commission to overturn North Carolina's law.

 <u>Accessibility/Connectivity Criteria:</u> We feel the current way this criteria is measured does not successfully address the aim for which it was created. We would like the scores to expressly reflect providing rural areas that have few employment opportunities better connections to jobs and job opportunities, as well as expanding the focus to health care, education and recreation.

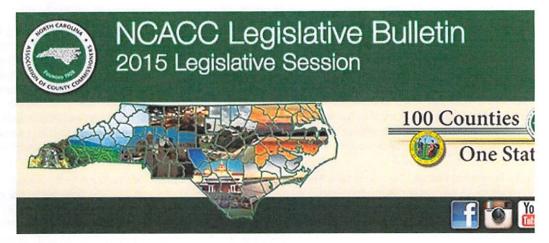
(The work group has discussed using the new statewide model to calculate this, however the statewide model includes very few SR routes and this model would not serve Division Need projects until SR routes are included in the model. Model needs to be vastly expanded before we are comfortable using it)

- <u>Multi-modal Criteria:</u> This criteria is trying to measure too many things. In particular it is focusing on moving people and moving freight. We would like to see current multi-modal criteria split into two areas; one for people moving (rail and transit depots, multi-modal centers) which could stay under the multi-modal name and one for freight movement (agriculture, ports) which could become the freight criteria named in the STI legislation. Additionally, we would like to see military facilities considered in the multi-modal and freight criteria
- <u>Hurricane Evacuations</u>: Based on NC Gen Stat § 136-102.7. which sets the standard for any bridge or highway construction project to allow for evacuations to occur in under 18 hours we feel this need to be incorporated into the SPOT scoring process so we can ensure our planning and projects are adhering to this standard.
- <u>Unique Formulas for Regional and Divisional Scoring</u>: As a member of Region A or B and Division 1, 2, 3, or 4 our MPO and RPO participated in choosing the criteria and the forming of our weights, in collaboration with our neighboring organizations and Division Engineers. The ability to tailor the weigh each criteria laid out in STI counted for our highway projects was something we appreciated and would like to see that opportunity provided to us again.
- <u>Ferry Systems:</u> Given that the ferry system makes connections along Regional Impact routes and provides a unique experience for the residents and visitors of North Carolina, adding to the character and attractiveness of the coastal area as a destination, we would like to see all ferry projects eligible at the regional impact level as well as the division needs level.
- <u>Short Line Rail lines</u>: Currently privately operated rail short lines are not eligible for funds under STI. This is problematic because there are state owned short lines at both of the NC ports that are contracted for operation by private companies. These short lines being state owned and serving major state facilities should be able to compete for funds in STI.
- <u>New Revenue Streams</u>: The major problem influencing investment is a lack of available funds for transportation infrastructure, whether it be capital improvements or maintenance. The gas tax is a declining revenue and needs to be supplemented or replaced. We are hearing the General Assembly will be discussing this in their current

session but does NCDOT have any suggestions, recommendations, or preferred path towards financial stability to address transportation needs?

- <u>Transportation Network Corridors Plan and the 25 Year Vision</u>: Both of these documents focus on many of the concerns we have along US 70 and US 17, such as fostering growth at the ports, and supporting the military mission. There are obvious connections and improvements that need to be made along these corridors to support those concerns and the growth of North Carolina in general. How can the NCTN Plan and the 25 Year Vision be tied to STI and the prioritization process to ensure their recommendations are being realized?
- Existing Investment in Projects: There are a number of significant projects that have obtained, or are close to obtaining, the necessary documents and permits to move forward with right of way acquisition and construction. However, some of these projects did not score well and are not in the draft STIP. How do we ensure that these projects continue to move forward and significant investment already made in them does not go unfulfilled?

Saine tells NCACC Committee that House probably won't consider major tax reform this session

The NCACC Tax and Finance Steering Committee met Thursday and heard from House Finance Co-Chair Jason Saine (right) and Secretary of Cultural Resources Susan Kluttz. Rep. Saine was asked about a proposal being discussed by members of the Senate to change how the local sales taxes are distributed to counties and cities. Rep. Saine said the House wants to assess the full impacts of the changes that were approved last session before making any more significant tax reform changes this session. Secretary Kluttz continued her statewide tour in support of reinstating the historic preservation tax credits. She said that the credits had been used in 90 of 100 counties and were important to preserve the state's historical landmarks and buildings. She told committee members that she believes she is making progress in the General Assembly and urged county commissioners to contact their legislators in support of these tax credits.



Rep. Jason Saine met with the NCACC Tax and Finance Steering Committee on Thursday and told them that the House is probably not going to consider any more significant tax reform changes this session.

Joint Appropriations Begin State Budget Cycle

The full Appropriations Committees met jointly on Thursday to hear the consensus forecast on revenues expected through the remainder of the fiscal year and those to support initial budget proposals for 2015-16, including the Governor's biennial budget. The General Assembly's Fiscal Research Division and the Governor's Office of State Budget and Management traditionally integrate their independent forecasts to arrive at a consensus forecast.

Through January, statewide revenue collections are \$215 million below the budget's \$11.8 billion target or roughly 1.3%. This shortfall in collections is expected to continue throughout the remainder of the fiscal year, resulting in current year revenue collections \$271 million below budget. Personal income taxes are down 5.8% through January. Sales taxes are ahead of target by 2.3%.

Overall, the consensus forecast projects a 2.9% increase in 2014-15 revenues above 2013-14 actuals, and 3.3% estimated growth in 2015-16. Higher growth is expected in the second year of the biennium, rising to 4.1% year over year. These forecasts are predicated on expected April personal income tax collections and lower refunds, with uncertainty in trending due to the fundamental changes in the state's income tax structure legislated in 2013.

Joint Appropriations also considered the expenditure side of the equation, with staff presentations on the 2014-15 state budget expectations and the outlook for 2015-16. Staff anticipate that the \$271 million revenue shortfall can be managed within current budget spending patterns. Preliminary 2015-16 base budget amounts of \$20.9 billion in comparison to the revenue forecast are projected to provide \$540 million in expansion dollars, but that excludes Medicaid growth, school enrollment growth, and earlier legislative commitments to increase teacher base pay to \$35,000. All told, these and other expected commitments eat up most of these expected expansion funds. Additional budget pressures include economic development incentives, historic tax credits, and public schools drivers' ed, to name a few, not considering state employee and teacher pay increases or demands for increased courts system funding.

As in recent practice, the House and Senate appropriations subcommittees held joint educational sessions to learn more about their respective areas of substance, including briefings on past budget actions and current status of programs and services. Prior to their convening, subcommittee chairs were given guidance for procedure, and subcommittees were provided protocols for committee consideration of external testimony. Subcommittee chairs were asked to maintain transparency within committee deliberations, to include open meetings and online document posting. They are to consult with other subcommittees for cross-cutting issues but are to refer to the full Appropriations chairs issues related to salary items, debt service, capital and other statewide matters.

Initial work within the joint subcommittees include plans to evaluate programs and services within their area of jurisdiction. Issues to be considered are whether the programs fulfill a constitutional requirement or are mandated by federal or state statutes. Are the programs appropriately funded? If funding is too high, subcommittees are asked to reduce funding levels, and if too low, to eliminate the program in its entirety or to fund the program's core services. Measures to manage growth or expenditures in mandatory services should be considered, and non-mandatory programs should be prioritized.

Joint HHS Appropriations Subcommittee Shifts Focus from Paying to Investing

The joint Health and Human Services Apppropriations Subcommittee changed its approach to program review and organized its workplan to consider program outcomes by shifting its focus from Paying to Investing. In staff presentations, the committee heard that while the nation as a whole spends twice as much on healthcare than other nations, its investments result in poorer outcomes. Fewer funds are made available in North Carolina for public health -- \$51 per capita in N.C. v. \$94 nationally. Overall, North Carolina ranks 37th nationally in health outcomes.

Within its workplan, the subcommittee will consider evaluations on integrating substance abuse facilities into LMEs and revising child-support incentives to improve county performance. The subcommittee will look at health outcomes and evidence-based policy making. It will also consider how North Carolina pays healthcare providers.

Senate committee approves unemployment bill vetoed by Gov. McCrory in 2014

A bill that would make several changes to the laws regarding unemployment insurance (UI) benefits passed the Senate Finance Committee this week. <u>S15</u> (Unemployment Insurance Law Changes) contains much of the same language that was included in a bill that was approved by the General Assembly last year and then vetoed by Gov. Pat McCrory. The bill would authorize the Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV) to disclose Social Security numbers to the Division of Employment Security (DES), for purposes of verifying employer and claimant identity. It amends the "actively seeking work" requirement to mandate that UI recipients make at least five job contacts with potential employers during the week. Existing law requires recipients to seek work on at least two different days during the week and make at least two contacts with prospective employers.

The bill would enact a new section establishing a Board of Review that would determine appeals policies and procedures and hear appeals arising from decisions and determinations of the DES. Notably, these are the same provisions to which Gov. McCrory objected in his veto message to the General Assembly regarding H1069.

<u>S15</u> reported favorably out of Senate Finance on Feb. 11 and is scheduled to be heard in the Senate on Feb. 17.



The Senate voted 35-15 this week to approve changes to the state's gas tax.

Senate approves bill to modify gas tax

The Senate voted 35-15 Thursday to approve a bill that makes substantial changes to the state's gas tax over the next few years. <u>S20</u> (IRC Update/Motor Fuel Tax Changes) lowers the gas tax from 37.5 cents/gallon to 35 cents/gallon effective March 1. Beginning Jan. 1, 2016, the gas tax will adjust annually based on changes to the average wholesale price of gas.

Currently the state's gas tax is a combination of a flat tax of 17.5 cents/gallon plus a 7 percent tax on the average wholesale price of gas that adjusts every six months as gas prices fluctuate. This bill keeps the flat tax and raises the wholesale tax on gas from 7 percent of the average wholesale price of gas to 9.9 percent. Under this bill, the tax will adjust every 12 months as gas prices fluctuate.

The short-term reduction in gas tax will cost the state about \$33 million. DOT will have to eliminate 550 positions to make up for the reduction in funds. General Assembly staff estimates the changes will raise \$1.2 billion in additional funds for transportation projects over the next four years. This would meet one of NCACC's legislative goals to support expanded state funding streams for public infrastructure.

The bill also contains technical provisions updating state tax code to accommodate changes to the federal tax code. The bill is now in the House of Representatives where it has not yet been referred to committee for consideration.

Legislature on ice after winter storm

A winter storm that dropped a significant amount of ice and snow throughout North Carolina on Monday and Tuesday put a severe freeze on activity at the General Assembly this week. Only seven bills were filed in the House, including two more local school calendar bills, and 20 bills were filed in the Senate this week.

The weather limited both chambers to mostly non-voting sessions, and while Joint Appropriations committees and policy committees were scheduled to meet throughout the week, most were cancelled due to the weather. On Thursday the Senate did take a final vote on <u>S15</u> (Unemployment Insurance Law Changes), passing the bill 40-6. The bill makes several changes to the laws regarding unemployment insurance (UI) benefits and contains much of the same language that was approved by the General Assembly last year and then vetoed by Gov. Pat McCrory. The bill is now in the House and has not yet been referred to a House committee.

Barring additional weather delays, the General Assembly should pick up activity next week. The House returns Monday at 1 p.m. while the Senate reconvenes at 4 p.m. On

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Tuesday, Joint Appropriations committees will continue discussing budgetary items, and policy committees will begin debating substantive legislation.

House makes changes to S14

On Wednesday, the House Appropriations committee approved several amendments to <u>S14</u> (Acad. Standards/Rules Review/Coal Ash/Funds), a Senate bill that directs or reallocates funds for various programs and issues that began in the last legislative session. The bill reallocates \$100,000 from the Department of Public Instruction to the Office of Administrative Hearings for a State Board of Education lawsuit against the State's Rules Review Commission. The bill also allocates \$275,000 for the Academic Standards Review Commission and \$630,000 to the Department of Public Safety to support the Coal Ash Management Commission as part of last session's Coal Ash Management Act.

The House added funds for the State's Health Information Exchange for providers and a provision giving the Department of Public Instruction flexibility in reallocating the Board of Education's lawsuit funds. The House changes also clarify and extend the hazardous dam inspection process under the Coal Ash Management Act and allow State officers to serve on the governing board for the State's new Economic Development Partnership. The bill is scheduled to be considered on the House floor next Tuesday.

<u>RPO</u>

The RPO Director has been quite busy and provides the following update:

The Draft Planning Work Program (PWP) for FY 15-16 has been submitted to the Transportation Planning Branch (TPB) for approval. I don't anticipate any concerns from the TPB regarding the PWP and it will be considered for final approval by both ARPO Boards at our April 22 meetings.

Senate Bill 20 would cut the gas tax on March 1, to 35 cents per gallon – and set 35 cents as a floor to prevent the tax from falling further in the future.

It passed the Senate Thursday afternoon and is headed through the House quickly. The full article can be found below:

Governor McCroy and Secretary Tata are asking the NCGA to try to review the NCDOT layoff requirement in the Bill as the NCDOT has already laid off 2,100 employees in the past 5 years and well as increased the efficiency of the Department. This Bill is also, what Secretary called, a defensive move to shore up transportation funds immediately and the NCGA continues to look into long term solutions for transportation infrastructure revenue.

House Bill 74 has been introduced to study the oversight of MPO's and RPO's and their role in Transportation Planning process. I have contacted Representatives Steinburg, Tine, Hunter and Senators Cook and Smith-Ingram to see if they have further information on the Legislation. RPO Directors across the State are also contacting their Legislators as well.

MPO and RPO Directors, along the US 70 and US 17 corridors, were asked to attend the US 70/US 17/Secretary Tata meeting in New Bern on Friday February 13 to support our Association members should they have questions about funding for specific projects in their respective counties. The Eastern MPO/RPO Coalition is asking for changes to the accessibility/connectivity criteria, multi-modal criteria, the addition of evacuation criteria, unique formulas for Regional and Divisional scoring, new and replacement ferry vessel funding out of the Regional funds, short line rail lines to be eligible for funds under the STI, new revenue streams, incorporation of the Transportation Network Corridors Plan and the Governor's 25 Year Vision into the scoring process, and ensuring existing projects with permits completed and ready to move forward with right-of-way acquisition get funded for construction. I continue to work with the SPOT 4.0 work group on issues the TCC and TAC Boards would like addressed in SPOT 4.0 as well.

During the meeting, Secretary Tata stated the NCGA is and will continue to discuss long term solutions for revenue to dredge the Moorehead City Port and Oregon Inlet. The State received money from the Army Corps of Engineers which will cover about 2 years of dredging work in

January. The Secretary has also finished lining up support for the US64/US17 Interstate designation and met with Congressman Butterfield about it at the end of January.

The SPOT 4.0 work group continues meeting to discuss the SPOT 4.0 process.

•The work group is open to using seasonal traffic counts as criteria if it can be calculated. They are working with ITRE for more information.

- •The work group has decided against using evacuation as a criteria in SPOT 4.0. However, we, on the Eastern MPO/RPO Coalition, continue to push for evacuation to be used as a criteria.
- •We do have support from the Eastern MPO/RPO Coalition to let new and replacement ferry vessels compete at the "Regional" pot of money instead of just the "Division" pot in SPOT 4.0.

•The SPOT 4.0 work group will meet once a month through May and I will provide more information as it becomes available.

At the US 70 US17 Association meeting on Friday, Secretary Tata stated he believes evacuation criteria should be used in SPOT 4.0 and will speak with the SPOT 4.0 work group again in hopes they will change their minds. He also said seasonal congestion will be used as a criteria in SPOT 4.0.

RPO

RPO Director, Angela Welsh provides the following update:

CTP work still continues for ARPO member counties. The Dare County CTP has been submitted for adoption by the Board of Transportation at their March meeting. Washington, Chowan and Gates County CTP's should be ready for adoption by their local Boards in the late spring/early summer. The Pasquotank CTP should be ready for local adoption in late summer. The Perquimans CTP is on hold due to a hiring freeze within the NCDOT-Transportation Planning Branch (TPB); however, I continue to work with the TPB to try to get a TPB engineer assigned to the Plan. I am hopeful we can schedule local adoptions of the Perquimans CTP by late summer. Once these CTP's are completed, and adopted by the Board of Transportation, all ARPO member counties will have an adopted CTP.

I also continue to work with the SPOT 4.0 work group regarding changes our region would like to see in the SPOT 4.0 process.

Other news important to the ARPO region:

HB 74 is an act to study the oversight of Metropolitan Planning Organizations and Rural Planning Organizations and their role in the transportation planning process. The bill was filed on February 11 by Representative Floyd, a Democrat from Fayetteville. As of now, it does not look like the bill will garner enough support to be fully vetted and debated. SB 20 (Gas Tax bill) The Senate gave final approval in a 35-15 vote last Thursday to SB 20 which would cut the state gas tax this year before placing a floor of 35 cents. The rate floor is expected to raise a projected 1.2 billion for transportation related needs by 2019. 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A bill to end tolling for all ferries in North Carolina reportedly was introduced in the General Assembly this week — just after the state had proposed funding cuts that would have made tolling more likely.

House Bill 93, sent to the House Transportation Committee on Wednesday, is at the beginning of the approval process. HB 93 still must pass through the House Transportation and House Appropriations committees to reach the House floor for a vote.

If approved, it would go to the Senate where "we face challenges," said lobbyists Joe and Henri McClees.

The pair were hired by Currituck County last year — and rehired this year — to fight against tolling of the Currituck-Knotts Island ferry and to lobby on Currituck's behalf in other matters.

"This is a good strategy because the N.C. Department of Transportation attempted, this month, to cut the Ferry Division annual budget by \$800,000," states a press release from the McCleeses, who are husband and wife.

"The internal cut was stopped, but if it had been implemented, DOT would have wanted to start tolling to create a revenue stream."

State Rep. Michael

Speciale, R-Craven, and state Rep. John Torbett, R-Gaston, were primary sponsors of the HB 93. State Reps. John Bell, R-Craven, Becky Carney, D-Mecklenburg, George Graham, D-Craven, Pricey Harrison, D-Guilford, and unaffiliated state Rep. Paul Tine of Dare County have signed on as co-sponsors.

An attempt to eliminate tolls failed last year in the General Assembly.

State Sen. Bill Cook, R-Beaufort, and a cosponsor introduced that bill.

The Tyrrell County Board of Commissioners adopted a resolution requesting construction of a new bridge across the Alligator River. New Medical Fee Schedule Expected to Save an Estimated \$27 Million in Annual Workers' Compensation Costs

FOR IMMEDIATE RELEASE

Raleigh, N.C. - The North Carolina Industrial Commission announced today the approval of three administrative rules which significantly revise its Medical Fee Schedule. The revised medical fee schedule is expected to provide the state's workers' compensation system with \$27 million in annual savings and encourage increased access to medical care. The new rules were approved by the Rules Review Commission at its February 19th meeting. The rules were initially proposed by the Industrial Commission in November 2014 and were the subject of a public hearing held in December 2014.

The changes to fees for institutional services are scheduled to take effect on April 1, while the revised rates for professional services will take effect starting on July 1. This will allow insurance carriers and health care providers to transition to the new fee schedule as seamlessly as possible.

The new Medical Fee Schedule replaces an out-of-date fee schedule and was developed in response to legislation requiring the Industrial Commission to revise its medical fee schedule to use current Medicare reimbursement rates and payment methodologies. These fee schedule changes reflect a compromise agreement between insurance carriers, hospitals, physicians, and other medical care providers. As a result, maximum fees for hospitals and other institutional providers are set to decrease, while fees for physicians, nurses, and other professional providers will increase. These adjustments will ensure that every workers' compensation patient is provided with timely and open access to all necessary medical care.

Page 86 of 117 An analysis by the National Council on Compensation Insurance (NCCI) projects that the new Medical Fee Schedule will result in approximately \$27 million in annual savings to the North Carolina workers' compensation system. This estimate is based upon 2013 written workers' compensation insurance premiums and self-insured employer data. These savings may continue to increase as North Carolina insurance carriers expand their workers' compensation premium base in response to the state's growing economy.

"The new Industrial Commission Medical Fee Schedule incorporates long needed revisions that will protect injured workers' access to healthcare while significantly reducing the overall cost of the workers' compensation system by establishing fair and reasonable fees for medical treatment," said Chairman Andrew T. Heath. "We understand that the \$27 million figure is an estimate, but this certainly is a very positive step. I'd like to thank all the stakeholders whose effort and insight made this greatly improved Medical Fee Schedule possible."

Mr. Michael Renshaw:

1. The 97th Civil Affairs Battalion (Airborne) requests support from Camden County for our unit's Mission Rehearsal Exercise (MRE) to be executed from March 29 to April 3, 2015. The unit requires realistic urban and rural areas where we can practice tactics, techniques, and procedures that our Soldiers will employ during Overseas Contingency Operations within foreign countries. Camden County, North Carolina offers an ideal setting for this training.

2. Specifically, we hope you will support our training by allowing our Soldiers to visit your county offices. The Soldiers of the 97th Civil Affairs Battalion (Airborne) would like to meet with members of the county's governmental services for the purpose of conducting assessments related to disaster preparedness and risk reduction. Meetings with county and local officials will be conducted during business hours, and every attempt will be made to minimize any disruption to normal county operations.

3. While in Camden County, the 97th Civil Affairs Battalion (Airborne) will:

a. Provide an operations brief to county officials prior to the execution of the training exercise.

b. If requested, provide daily updates to county officials regarding the exercise's training progress.

c. Conduct interviews with local officials, but will not publish their names. Interviewees may decline to answer any/all questions, whether of a personal or professional nature. Any information provided shall be on a voluntary basis and will be used for exercise purposes only. At the conclusion of the exercise, any associated information/documentation will be appropriately discarded.

d. Not gather nor electronically store any Personally Identifiable Information on any local official or member of the public. Only aliases of individuals voluntarily participating in the exercise shall be used.

e. Contact the County Manager or his/her delegated representative and provide results of the training exercise based on assessments conducted by the 97th Civil Affairs Battalion (Airborne).

f. Not carry firearms of any kind (government-issued or privately owned).

g. Will be dressed in casual or business casual civilian attire throughout the duration of the exercise. At no time, will Soldiers conduct themselves outside of their capacity as an exercise participant and service member in the United States Army.

h. Adhere to all local, state, and federal laws.

i. Use Geographical Information Systems to conduct topographical and hazards-based analysis of the county.

j. Not conduct any offensive or defensive combat training scenarios within county limits.

k. Immediately inform local authorities of any incident involving any member of the 97th Civil Affairs Battalion (Airborne).

4. Additionally, please contact me or my staff with regard to any incident that involves our Soldier(s) while in your county.

DHHS Approval Letter

CoastalCare and ECBH received a letter from Deputy Secretary Dave Richard dated February 9, 2015, approving the consolidation agreement and proposed governance structure.

With a population of at least 1,250,000, the consolidated organization meets statutory requirements to deviate from mandated Board structure. The proposed board structure and composition provides for an appropriate governance structure and was therefore approved. Each County Board of Commissioners must also approve the governance structure.

Consolidation Project Plan Progress

Consolidated functional teams are working together to accomplish the steps outlined for becoming a new LME/MCO by July 1. Here is a brief overview of progress we have made in various areas to date:

Dear Michael Renshaw:

The Boards of Coastal Care, serving Brunswick, Carteret, New Hanover, Onslow and Pender Counties, and East Carolina Behavioral Health, serving Beaufort, Bertie, Camden, Chowan, Craven, Currituck, Dare, Gates, Hertford, Hyde, Jones, Martin, Northampton, Pamlico, Pasquotank, Perquimans, Pitt, Tyrrell, and Washington Counties, have entered into an agreement to consolidate our agencies. This consolidation, which will be effective July 1, 2015, is in line with the Medicaid Reform Plan developed by the NC Department of Health and Human Services and endorsed by Governor Pat McCrory. We believe that this consolidation will create an even stronger organization than we are currently as separate agencies and will position us to provide even better services to individuals in our twenty-four counties who need mental health, developmental disability and substance abuse services.

We recognize that as many positive aspects as we believe there are for the consolidation, there may be some concern that a larger agency will be less responsive to the needs of individual communities and to other partner agencies, such as county Departments of Social Services, Sheriff's Departments, etc. To address these concerns, we are planning to create three regions within the consolidated entity. The regions have been designed to balance, to the extent possible, the number of counties, total population and geography covered in each region. The largest region will include ten counties and the smallest will serve six. Each region will have a Regional Director and a Regional Advisory Board. We are proposing that the members of the Regional Advisory Boards be appointed by the Boards of County Commissioners of the counties served by the region.

The new organization will require the creation of a new Area Board. NC law permits Area Authorities with populations greater than 1,250,000 to design and appoint members to the Area Board in a manner different from that detailed in statute, with the approval of the Secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) and the constituent counties. We are proposing that the Area Board be comprised of members of the Regional Advisory Boards, appointed by the Regional Advisory Boards. This alternative governance structure has already received the required approval from the Secretary of DHHS. We are now seeking approval from the twenty-four county Boards of County Commissioners.

We have attached a PowerPoint slide deck that explains this proposal in greater detail. Also attached is draft Resolution we would request be adopted by your Board of Commissioners. We are requesting your feedback on this resolution and will be contacting the Clerk to your Board to



schedule a time when we may present this proposal to your Board. We would also appreciate your input on the best way to make that presentation – should we use the PowerPoint or not, and what other information might your Board wish to have in order to approve the resolution.

Resolution of Support for an Alternative Governance Structure for the Area Authority serving Camden County

WHEREAS, in accordance with N. C. General Statute § 122C – 115 (c1), the Area Board of CoastalCare, an Area Authority serving Brunswick, Carteret, New Hanover, Onslow and Pender Counties and the Area Board of East Carolina Behavioral Health, an Area Authority serving Beaufort, Bertie, Camden, Chowan, Craven, Currituck, Dare, Gates, Hertford, Hyde, Jones, Martin, Northampton, Pamlico, Pasquotank, Perquimans, Pitt, Tyrrell, and Washington Counties, have entered into an agreement to consolidate their agencies into a twenty-four county Area Authority serving all previously names counties; and

WHEREAS, the Secretary of the N. C. Department of Health and Human Services has approved this consolidation, as required by law; and

WHEREAS, N. C. General Statute § 122C - 118.1, which specifies the composition of an Area Authority Board, permits an alternative Area Board structure to be implemented 1) if the total population of the Area Authority catchment area exceeds 1,250,000 and 2) if the counties which comprise the Area Authority agree by resolution to an alternative structure; and

WHEREAS, the total population of the new Area Authority created by the consolidation of CoastalCare and East Carolina Behavioral Health is 1,260,778; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the residents of the twenty-four counties to approve an alternative governance structure for the consolidated Area Authority;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that we, the Camden County Board of Commissioners, do hereby approve the structure of the Area Board and the Regional Advisory Boards of the consolidated Area Authority, as outlined below.

To provide a local presence in the counties served and to assure that each county has input into the services received by its residents, the twenty-four county catchment area will have three regions. The regions have been designed to equalize, to the extent possible, the number of counties, population in the region, and overall square mileage of the regions. The three regions and the counties served are:

Northern Region: Bertie, Camden, Chowan, Currituck, Gates, Hertford, Martin, Northampton, Pasquotank and Perquimans Counties.

Central Region: Beaufort, Craven, Dare, Hyde, Pamlico, Pitt, Tyrell and Washington Counties.

Southern Region: Brunswick, Carteret, Jones, New Hanover, Onslow and Pender Counties.

The counties in each region will appoint two members to the Regional Advisory Board: one county commissioner or designee and another individual who meets the requirements outlined in N. C. G. S. § 122C - 118.1 (b). In addition, the Regional Advisory Board will include the Chair

or designee of the regional Consumer and Family Advisory Committee. County Commissioner members of the Regional Advisory Boards may serve for as long as they are a commissioner. Other members of the Regional Advisory Board may serve for up to three, three year consecutive terms.

The primary functions of the Regional Advisory Board will be to advise the Area Authority Chief Executive Officer on the evaluation and hiring of a Regional Director; recommending priorities for expenditure of state and county funds for development of the annual budget; determining local priorities for inclusion in the overall strategic plan; identifying community needs and concerns; monitoring resolution of issues; and monitoring performance at the local level, including access to care, expenditure of service funds, number of consumers served, services delivered, provider network size and composition, outcomes, and consumer satisfaction.

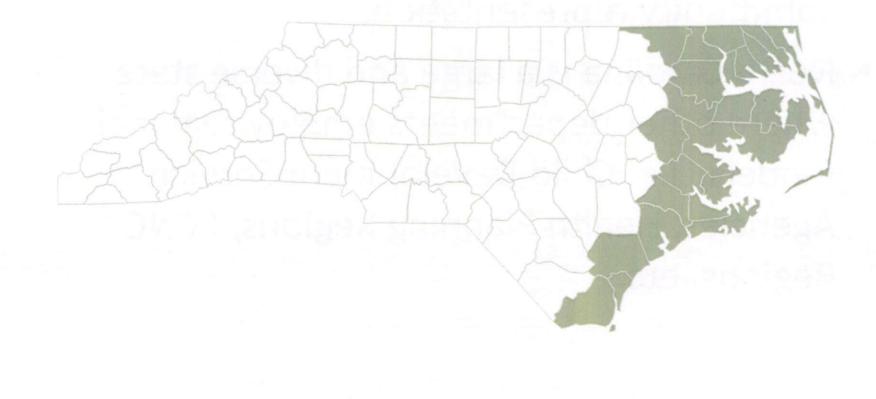
Each Regional Advisory Board will establish its own bylaws based on local needs, but in compliance with standardized requirements established by the Governing Board for quorums, frequency of meetings, elections of officers, duties of members, committees and committee appointments, and attendance standards. Such bylaws are subject to the approval of the Governing Board.

Each Regional Advisory Board will select four (4) members to serve as the Area Authority Governing Board: one county commissioner, the Consumer and Family Advisory Committee chair or designee, and two other members. In addition, the chair or designee of the Area Authority Network Council shall serve on the Governing Board as a non-voting member. The county commissioner members of the Governing Board shall serve one three year term without consecutive reappointment, so that commissioner representation on the Governing Board will rotate among the counties in each region. The other members of the Governing Board may serve three, three year terms.

The Governing Board's primary responsibilities will include determining policy; strategic planning, including consideration of local priorities as determined by the Regional Advisory Boards; budgets; hiring and evaluations of the Chief Executive Officer; monitoring of deliverables, including overall performance and financial management; government affairs and advocacy; reporting to constituent counties; responding to concerns and feedback from the Regional Advisory Boards; reviewing, revising and approving the Regional Advisory Board bylaws; and all other responsibilities outlined in N. C. law for Area Authority Boards. The Governing Board will develop and adopt bylaws to address its activities in accordance with law.

Regional Model

- As we move toward consolidation of MCOs, a regional model is essential for broad community representation.
- North Carolina is a large and diverse state where other departments employ regional models, i.e. Child Development Service Agencies, Health Planning Regions, CCNC Regions, etc.

The CoastalCare/ECBH Consolidation Board Structure

- The CoastalCare/ECBH governance structure was designed by the CoastalCare/ECBH Board Consolidation Steering Committee
- The proposed two-tiered board structure will keep governance close to the communities we serve through Regional Advisory Boards, which in turn elect representatives to the governing Board of Directors.

Consolidation Board (continued)

- Under current North Carolina General Statute 122C-118.1, area mental health board authorities are governed by Area Boards established by the Boards of Commissioners in each catchment area. 122C-118.1 states:
 - "an area board shall have no fewer than 11 and no more than 21 members. The board of county commissioners, or the boards of county commissioners within the area, shall appoint members"
 - "The boards of county commissioners within a multicounty area with a catchment population of at least 1,250,000 shall have the option to appoint members of the area board in a manner or with a composition other than as required by this section by each county adopting a resolution to that effect and receiving written approval from the Secretary"
 - With CoastalCare and ECBH, we exceed the 1,250,000 population

- To provide local participation in monitoring the performance and services within each region

Regional Advisory Boards Responsibilities

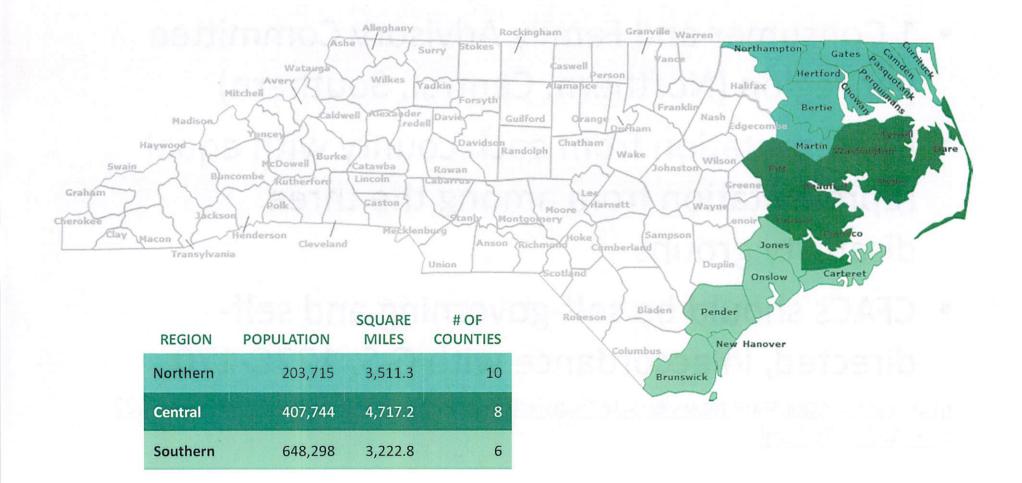

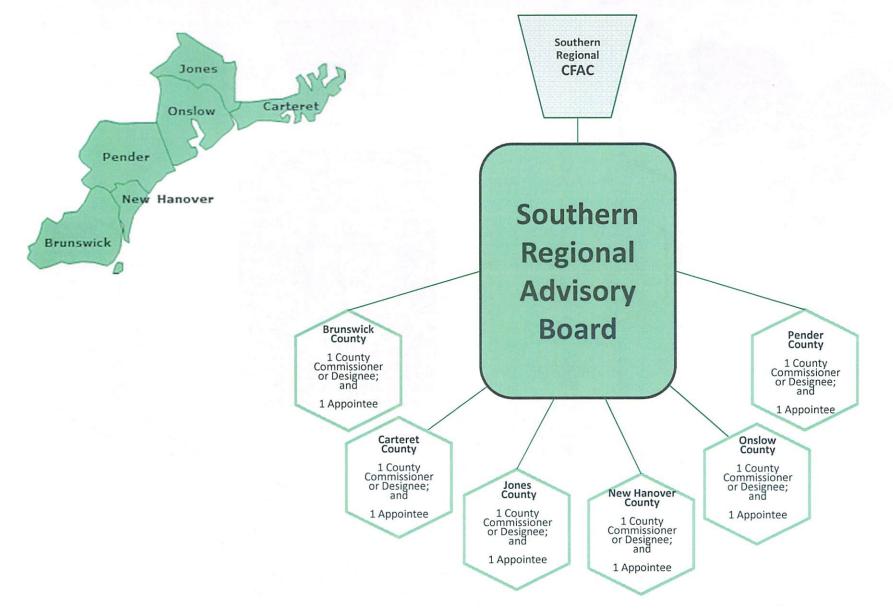

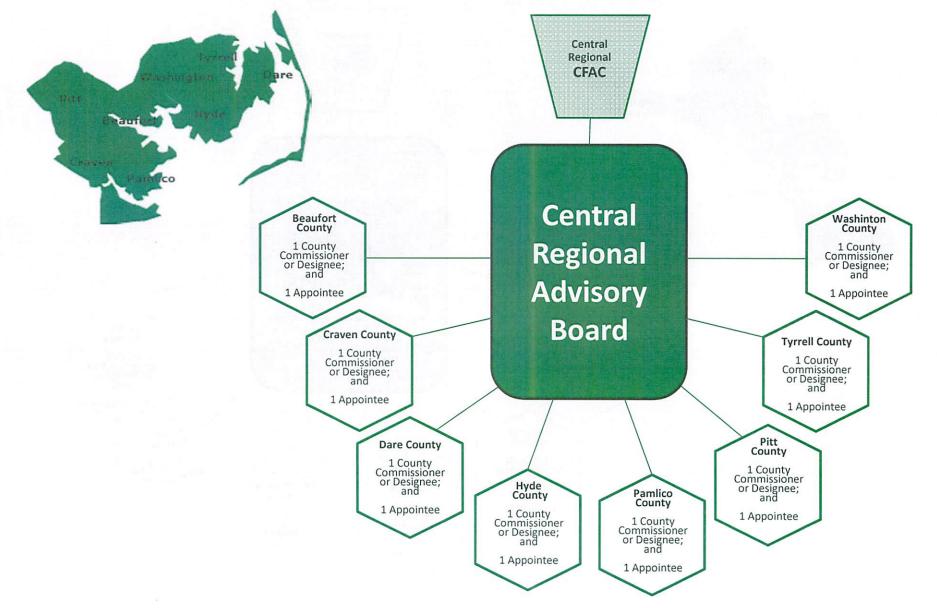
Three Proposed Regions



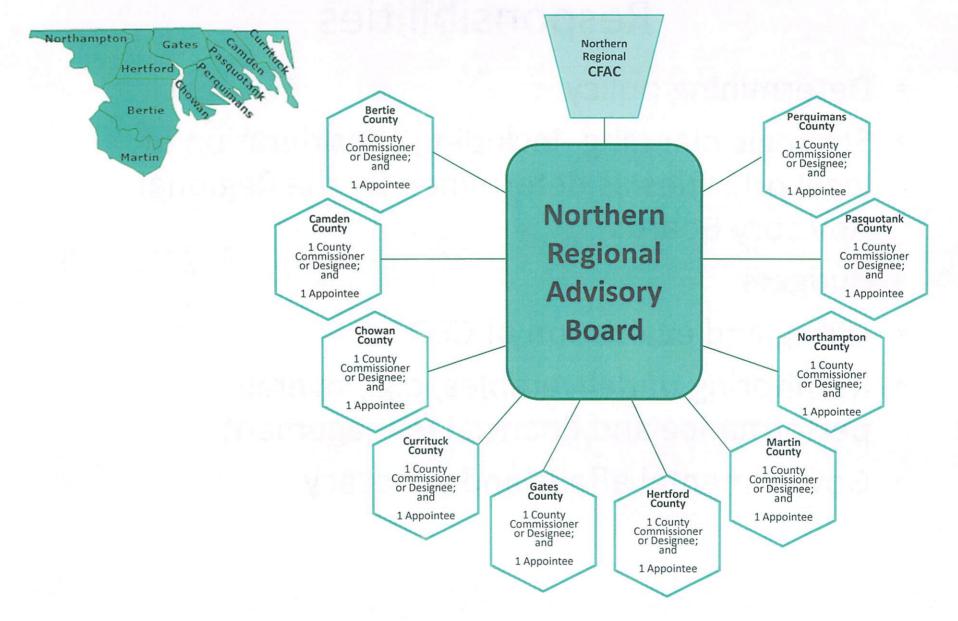

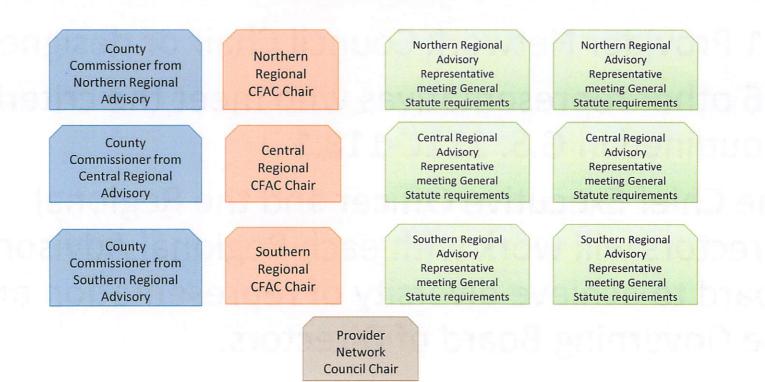

Governing Board of Directors Terms of Office

- The terms of office for County Commissioners shall be three years, with no re-appointment upon the expiration of a term, without a break in service.
- This will ensure each county in the region will have a County Commissioner on the Governing Board on a rotating basis.
- The terms of non-commissioners on the governing Board of Directors shall be three years, with a maximum of three consecutive terms of office.

Creation of Initial Governing Board of Directors

To provide continuity for the initial creation of the Governing Board of Directors, the Regional Advisory Boards shall designate one member to a one-year term, one to a two-year term and two to three-year terms of office.

When those terms expire, the standard threeyear term outlined above will apply to all members.

ARTICLE I. GENERAL PROVISIONS

Section 1. Purpose of the Policy

It is the purpose of this policy and the rules and regulations set forth to establish a fair and uniform system of personnel administration for all employees of the County under the supervision of the County Manager, elected officials, Elections Board, and Social Services Board. These aforementioned entities are the official appointing authorities covered by this personnel policy. State requirements will supersede these policies for positions subject to the State Personnel Act whenever there is a conflict. This policy is established under authority of G.S. 153A, Article 5 and G.S. 126 of the General Statutes of North Carolina.

Section 2. Merit Principles

All appointments and personnel actions shall be made on the basis of merit. All positions requiring the performance of the same duties and fulfilment of the same responsibilities shall be assigned to the same class and salary grade. No applicant for County employment or employee shall be deprived of employment opportunities or otherwise be adversely affected as an employee because of an individual's race, color, religion, sex, national origin, political affiliation, qualified disability, or age.

Section 3. Responsibilities of the County Board of Commissioners

The County Board of Commissioners shall be responsible for establishing and approving human resources policies, the position classification and pay plan, and it may change the policies and benefits as necessary. The Board also shall make and confirm appointments when so specified by the general statutes.

Section 4. Responsibilities of the County Manager

The County Manager shall be responsible to the County Board of Commissioners for the administration and technical direction of the human resources program. The County Manager shall appoint, suspend, and remove County officers and employees except those elected by the people or whose appointment is otherwise provided for by law. The County Manager shall make appointments, dismissals and suspensions in accordance with the state statutes and other policies and procedures spelled out in other Articles in this Policy.

The County Manager shall:

- recommend rules and revisions to the personnel system to the County Board of Commissioners for consideration;
- b) make changes as necessary to maintain an up to date and accurate position classification plan;
- recommend necessary revisions to the pay plan;
- d) determine which employees shall be subject to the overtime provisions of FLSA;
- f) develop and administer such recruiting programs as may be necessary to obtain an adequate supply of competent applicants to meet the needs of the County;
- g) perform such other duties as may be assigned by the County Board of Commissioners not inconsistent with this Policy; and
- appoint an employee to the role of Human Resources Director or serve in that role for the County.

Section 5. Responsibilities of the Human Resources Director

The responsibilities of the Human Resources Director are to make recommendations to the County Manager on the following:

- a) recommend rules and revisions to the personnel system to the County Manager for consideration;
- recommend changes as necessary to maintain an up to date and accurate position classification plan;
- recommend necessary revisions to the pay plan;
- d) recommend which employees shall be subject to the overtime provisions of FLSA;
- e) maintain a roster of all persons in the County service
- f) establish and maintain a list of authorized positions in the County service at the beginning of each budget year which identifies each authorized position, class title of position, salary range, any changes in class title and status, position number and other such data as may be desirable or useful;
- g) develop and administer such recruiting programs as may be necessary to obtain an adequate supply of competent applicants to meet the needs of the County;
- h) develop and coordinate training and educational programs for County employees;
- I) investigate periodically the operation and effect of the personnel provisions of this policy; and
- j) perform such other duties as may be assigned by the County Manager not inconsistent with this Policy.

In the event there is no Human Resources Office, these duties will be assumed by the County Manager or his/her designee.

Section 6. Application of Policies, Plan, Rules, and Regulations

This personnel policy and all rules and regulations adopted pursuant thereto shall be binding on all County employees. The County Manager, County Attorney, elected officials, Clerk to the Board of Commissioners, Tax Administrator, Finance Officer, appointed members of the County Board and advisory boards and commissions will be exempted except in sections where specifically included. An employee violating any of the provisions of this policy shall be subject to appropriate disciplinary action, as well as prosecution under any civil or criminal laws which have been violated.

Section 7. Departmental Rules and Regulations

Due to the particular personnel and operational requirements of the various departments of the County, each department is authorized to establish supplemental rules and regulations applicable only to the personnel of that department. All such rules and regulations shall be subject to the approval of the County Manager or designee, and shall not in any way conflict with the provisions of this Policy, but shall be considered as a supplement to this Chapter.

The Sheriff or Register of Deeds may utilize this Personnel Policy for use in his/her department at his/her discretion. If the Sheriff or Register of Deeds declines to utilize all or any part of this Personnel Policy for his/her department, then none of this Personnel Policy shall apply to that department and the County Commissioners shall not be bound by this Policy and shall not be required (except as required by the General Statutes) to provide any funding, assistance, staffing, or other resource to the Sheriff or Register of Deeds declining to abide by all or any part of this Personnel Policy.

Section 8. Definitions

For the purposes of this chapter, the following words and phrases shall have the meanings respectively ascribed to them by this section:

Adverse Action. An involuntary demotion, reduction in pay, suspension, reduction in force, or separation from employment.

Anniversary Date. The employee's most recent date of employment with the county service in a permanent position.

Appointing Authority. Any County board or official with the legal authority to make hiring decisions.

Classification. A title of a single or group of positions which are sufficiently similar to require the same set of knowledge, skills, abilities, education and experience qualifications.

Department. (Webster's 2003) A field of activity.

Full-time employee. An employee who is in a position for which an average work week equals at least 40 hours, and continuous employment of at least 12 months, is required by the County

Part-time employee. An employee who is in a position for which an average work week of at least 20 hours and less than 40 hours and continuous employment of at least 12 months is required by the County.

Permanent position. A position authorized for the budget year for a full twelve months and budgeted for twenty or more hours per week. All County positions are subject to budget review and approval each year by the Board of Commissioners and all employees' work and conduct must meet County standards. Therefore, reference to "permanent" positions or employment should not be construed as a contract or right to perpetual funding or employment.

Probationary employee. An employee appointed to a full or part-time regular position who has not yet successfully completed the designated probationary period of six months. Persons in trainee or work against appointments are a probationary employee for the full duration of their appointment in that status.

Regular employee. An employee appointed to a full or part-time position who has successfully completed the designated probationary period.

Temporary employee. An employee appointed to a position for which either the average work week required by the County over the course of a year is less than 20 hours, or continuous employment required by the County is less than 12 months.

Trainee. An employee status when an applicant is hired (or employee promoted) who does not meet all of the requirements for the position. During the duration of a trainee appointment, the employee is on probationary status.

Unit. (Webster 2003) A single person or group especially as a part of a whole.

Work Against Appointment. In departments whose employees are subject to the State Personnel Act, the appointing authority may appoint an employee in a work against situation. When qualified applicants are unavailable and there is no trainee provision for the classification of the vacancy, the appointing authority may appoint an employee below the level of the regular classification in a "work against" appointment. This appointment is for the purpose of allowing the employee to gain the qualifications needed for the full class through on the job experience. A work against appointment may not be made when applicants are available who meet the training and experience requirements for the full class in the position being recruited. During the duration of the work against appointment, the employee is on probationary status.
